

Weighing the Cost

What is the price of a child's smile, or the cost of a friendly greeting?

Here at Beth-El we work every day to be messengers of hope. It can be challenging some days for our little staff of eight when there is so much we want to do and so few resources available.

Already this year, Beth-El has distributed over 200,000 pounds of food to over 7000 farmworking families. Sometimes the lines for our Tuesday pantry extend to the far reaches of our parking lot. Still another 3,000 farmworkers, unable to make the trip



to the mission, have received resources directly at their place of employment. How do you

place a value on something like that?



Every day is a little bit different at the mission. These last few weeks we have been blessed with nurses pursuing their bachelor's degree through the State College of Florida. A visit to Beth-El has become a regular part of their curriculum--one that can open the eyes of even the most hardened first responder.

Summer will be here before you know it. Soon our hallways will be filled with the sounds of children enjoying vacation bible school or traveling to Cedarkirk for a week of summer camp. Before summer's end the dental clinic will open, providing the only free dental service for those in our community without any insurance.

Even now, Beth-El has provided six scholarships for students to attend college later this year. They are the first in their families to ever pursue an advanced education, and their interests are as varied as the stories they share. One student will be pursuing a degree in astrobiology in hopes of working for NASA someday. Her parents, who have worked in the fields their whole lives, stressed the value of an education, "because they knew the hardships of not having one."

When our staff feels strained and volunteers are few, it is easy to get discouraged by all the many things we face every day. A frequent question is, "will we need to cut back on our services?" Yet, how can you put a price tag on a child's smile? What is the cost of those fleeting moments sharing a tear with one whose labor is hard and burdens many? When we measure the cost in those terms we know that what we are trying to do here at Beth-El holds immeasurable value.



Summer will be here soon. Will we have the financial means to continue sending our kids to camp? Will we have enough people to fill all our volunteer led services? All of these are questions only you can help answer. What are the ways you can invest in the future of this

ministry? Rest assured, it will be one of the best investments you ever make.
